DISCUSSION GUIDE

ICEBREAKER: What is the benefit of meditation?

OVERVIEW: The very last story in the gospel of John is about jealousy. Why? Perhaps jealousy is more destructive than we think. Maybe there is something about jealousy that especially hazardous to the church and to Christ's mission on earth, and Jesus wanted to give us one final warning about it. In this discussion we will go deeper with how to gain victory over jealousy.

- 2. Have you ever been jealous? Explain.
- 3. Have you ever been mistreated because of jealousy? Explain.
- 4. Have you ever seen jealousy affect a church, team, or company? Explain.
- 5. Read James 3:14-17.
 - a. This passage warns against bitter envy (jealousy) and selfish ambition. How are these two sins related?

- 6. What is jealousy?
- 7. The sermon made the point that jealousy hurts your relationship with others and God. How does it do this?
- 8. What does a jealous heart reveal about a person?
- 9. What must we do to gain victory over jealousy?
