DISCUSSION GUIDE

ICEBREAKER: What's an example of your passive-aggressive side?

OVERVIEW: What comes to mind when you hear the word "slave"? You might think of the 12.5 million Africans who were forced into slavery and shipped across the Atlantic Ocean to the New World. Whatever comes to mind, it's probably nothing good. Today we think of slavery as a terrible institution that no one should have to experience. But the Bible uses the word "slave" to describe Christians. It calls us Christ's slaves. In this study we will go deeper with how to be faithful slaves of Christ.

- 8. Which of the five parallels do you most need to grow in? Explain.
- 9. Are you comfortable with being Christ's slave? Explain.
