DISCUSSION GUIDE

ICEBREAKER: What magic tricks do you know? Perform one now.

OVERVIEW: Emerson said, "In my walks, every man I meet is my superior in some way, and in that I learn something from him." In other words, you can learn something from everyone you meet — even if it is what NOT to do. This week we are going deeper with the story of Rahab to learn about faith from a prostitute.

- 1. What insight, principle, or observation from this weekend's message did you find to be the most helpful, eye-opening, or troubling? Explain. (Or what was your key takeaway from Sunday's message?)
- 2. What have you learned from someone's bad example?
- 3. What have you learned from someone's good example?
- 4. What is the most surprising thing about Rahab's story?
- In the story of Rahab we are reminded that anyone can be saved and changed — even a Gentile prostitute. We see a New Testament example of this in the life of Paul. Read Philippians 3:4-10.
 - a. What was Paul like before Christ?
 - b. In what ways did Paul change after his conversion?
 - c. How did such a change come about?
 - d. What is the most amazing conversion you have ever seen?

- 6. Refer to Sunday's sermon and answer the following questions.
 - a. James points to the story of Rahab to argue that faith is proven by works (James 2:25-26). What did he mean by this? How does the story of Rahab illustrate this?
 - b. What do your works say about your faith?
 - c. How does Rahab's story teach us that faith takes great risks for God? What have you had to risk for Christ? Is it possible for a Christian to not take risks for God? Explain.
 - How does Rahab's story illustrate the truth that faith is uncommon? Are you willing to be different, to stand out, to stand alone for Christ? Explain.
