DISCUSSION GUIDE

ICEBREAKER: What do you think most people think about the Bible?

OVERVIEW: Christians love the cross. Most of us wear cross jewelry and display cross decorations at home and at work. We love the cross because to us it represents Christ's death on the cross for our sins. But the cross doesn't only represent what Christ did for us, it represents what we are to do for Jesus.
