## **DISCUSSION GUIDE**

**ICEBREAKER**: What's your favorite book of the Bible? Explain.

**OVERVIEW**: A 2022 Gallup survey found that 81% of Americans profess belief in God. That's an all-time low, but it's still 81%. Why do so many people believe in something they can't see. 81% don't believe in Santa Claus, or the Tooth Fairy, or in aliens. Why do so many people believe in God? The answer is that God has made His existence obvious. In this discussion we will go deeper with the three main arguments for the existence of God.
